08:33:45 From Ilana Lowery to Everyone: the FCC in the new Net Neutrality rules decided at the last minute to ban states from requiring broadband ISPs to contribute to state Universal Service Funds (USFs). According to a 2018 survey by the National Regulatory Research Institute, 42 states and D.C. have USF programs. Sidelining states was FCC policy in the 2015 Net Neutrality rules, but the same language was missing from FCC Chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel's April 4 draft.

08:34:00 From Ilana Lowery to Everyone: Drawing little attention, lawyers for cable ISPs Comcast, Charter and Cox urged the FCC to freeze out the states. According to FCC and industry sources, Footnote 1,476 in the final order affirmed the agency's commitment to the 2015 policy, yielding a win for the cable ISPs. Footnote 1,476 reads: "Pursuant to our forbearance from 254(d) to maintain the status quo for contributions based on the provision of [Broadband Internet Access Service], and consistent with the 2015 Open Internet Order, we maintain the status quo with respect to states' ability to impose state-level contribution obligations on the provision of BIAS for state universal service programs."

08:34:22 From Ilana Lowery to Everyone: The cable ISPs applauded the FCC's national approach to USF funding. "Despite intense pressure from several public interest and telecom industry groups to allow states to assess broadband subscribers with [USF] fees, the FCC determined that it should forbear from this obligation which could have raised consumer home Internet bills by billions of dollars if approved," an industry source said. In the Net Neutrality rules adopted April 25, the FCC said it would not require broadband ISPs to contribute to the \$8.1 billion federal USF either. That pledge was included in the April 4 draft.
